STUDENT-LED Conferences 3:30-9:30

WHY DO STUDENTS LEAD THE CONFERENCES?

e believe that student involvement in the conferences makes learning active, provides opportunities for students to evaluate their own performance, and encourages students to take responsibility for their learning. Having students take charge of the conference makes them more accountable for what they are learning.

In addition, this form of conferencing creates a partnership between the home and the school that is hard to get in any other way. Both research and experience have demonstrated that student-led conferences offer many benefits including the following:

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Stronger sense of accountability among students - **Stronger** sense of

pride in achievement among students -More productive student-teacher relationships - **Development** of leadership skills among students -**Greater** parental participation in conferences, & **Increased** teacher focus on standard.

What Does a Student-Led Conference Look Like?

Prior to the conference, students will collect work that reflects what they have learned. Students will select work samples to show their strengths and weaknesses. This work will usually be assembled in a portfolio or folder. As the students conduct the conference, they will explain skills they have learned and share goals they have set for themselves.

Parent's Role?

We believe that student-led conferences are an important experience for all students and hope that all parents will be able to participate. Your role is critical to the success of the conference.

Listener...

Your first role is as a listener. Having a parent audience for learning gives students a powerful reason to learn and work hard.

What's the Role of the Student During Student-Led Conferences?

Students should be able to explain academic standards, discuss how the standards are reflected in their classroom work, and be able to set goals for improving performance during the next academic term.

What's the Role of the Teacher in Student-Led Conferences?

Teachers have several roles in preparing and conducting student-led conferences. Critical to the success of the conferences are three major activities:

• The teacher makes sure that all students know and can discuss the academic standards.

- The teacher makes sure conference materials are available for students and parents.
- The teacher organizes the conferences to ensure successful communication.

What Should a Parent Do If He or She Cannot Attend the Conference?

Student-led conferences can be a very valuable time for you and your child. Please do your best to be available for these conferences. If it is not possible for you to attend alternate appointment times, you may want to ask a grandparent, another relative, or perhaps a family friend to take your place.

Talk...

Your second role as a parent is to talk with the student about the work that will be presented. You will gain a better understanding of the academic expectations set for your child.

Support...

Your third role as a parent is to identify ways you can support the student to achieve goals that will be set for the next grading period.

PARENTING WITH LOVE & LOGIC

Does your child habitually sneer, roll their eyes, or make sounds resembling an alley cat trying to cough up a hairball? Does this happen just about every time you say or do something they dislike?

The danger in allowing this behavior is that actions shape beliefs and attitudes. Yep! If anyone acts annoyed or offended often enough, seeds of discontent and feelings of victimhood sprout in their hearts, leading to pervasive feelings of being tread upon.

Let their arrows miss the target.

Kids launch these emotional missiles in order to strike at the heart. Our greatest source of power against such attacks is showing that they don't get the desired result of anger, lectures, threats, or frustration.

Expect mature expression of feelings.

Doing your best to remain calm, reply, "I will know that you are really maturing when you can share your feelings without giving dirty looks or huffing. If you feel something I do is unfair, we can have a mature discussion when both of us are calm." Reinforce mature expression by listening with respect.

A great irony: When our kids are able to talk to us about how they feel, they are less likely to act these feelings out in nasty, disrespectful, or irresponsible ways. Listening means demonstrating we care about their opinions. It also means reinforcing healthy, mature expression of opinions and emotions. It's not about allowing them to run the home. It's about ending infantile drama in the home.

Provide empathy and consequences if the problem continues.

When this behavior has become seriously habitual, wise parents consistently apply a rather generic consequence: "I allow (or do) ______ as long as my energy is not being drained by dirty looks."

The key to rebuilding respect from our kids involves proving to them that we can handle them without getting frustrated or angry.

When you call the office to schedule an appointment, you will need to provide the following: your child's full name


- date of birth

You will also be mailed a questionnaire. This questionnaire assesses your child's self-help skills, socialemotional skills, and their transition skills. It is important for you to fill out the questionnaire as accurately as possible. It will assist in gaining accurate scores for your child.

After you child completes the screening, it will be scored by the Preschool Consultant from Tuttle. She will explain any questions that you may have. The entire process may take from 60-90 minutes. To save some time for you, if your child is currently in enrolled in PreKindergarten, we will pick him/her up in the classroom, and call you when your results are ready.


Award Ceremony

The board members whose terms are expiring are Lucy Meidinger, who represents a Rural At Large position of the Ashley school district and Lyle Fey, who represents a City position. Any person residing outside the city limits of Ashley but within the rural area of the Ashley School District may file for the Rural At Large position. Any person residing within the city limits of Ashley may file for the City position. Candidates for the three-year term must file a statement of candidacy and statement of interests with the business manager before 4:00pm on the fourth (4) day of April, 2016. There are no petition signatures required for school board candidacy.
