Mrs. Dockter – I loved listening to Holly, she has such a great message for all. She is blessed with many talents and I am grateful she is sharing them!




HOLLY HOFFMAN survivor nicaragua season 21 Finalist

Ashley students and staff were fortunate to have a celebrity speak on January 20th. Born and raised in Eureka, South Dakota, Holly Hoffman was the last remaining member of the Espada Tribe and the last woman standing on Season 21 of CBS' hit reality show "Survivor Nicaragua". TECH TALK WITH THE DOC




The Inventions and Innovations class will soon be constructing their first invention, the Jelly Bean Dispenser. However, to start the 3rd quarter, students researched inventions of the past and people like Leonardo Da Vinci, a person sometimes referred to as the Father of Invention. His ideas, which were illustrated in notebooks were so sought after, that one notebook sold for \$30 Million Dollars. Also, during Leonardo's time, and long before there were intellectual property (IP) protections like patents, trademarks and copyrights, he used mirrored writing to write his notes in such a way that others would have difficulty reading and ultimately stealing his ideas. As an enriching activity, students were challenged to use mirrored writing on a couple of activities. To be sure, sometimes Leonardo is only remembered for his art, but he

was also fascinated with mechanisms and how they worked – combined with his artistic ability to illustrate – he had created rare and sought after technological advancements that were well beyond their time.

The Technological Systems class finished assembling/constructing catapults. This unit focuses on the concept of system calibration, the ability to adjust the input on a machine in order to affect the output of that machine. On catapults, a weapon used centuries ago, students tested how adjusting the lever arm and vertical support position affected the travel distance of a given projectile – in this case a ping pong ball. Students also are learning about the launch and pull back angles and how they can affect the trajectory path of the projectile. Almost all systems allow for calibrations, it is important that students understand that adjusting a system is an important part of proper and appropriate operation of that system or machine.





The Technological Design class is currently working on a transportation challenge whereby student groups (traffic engineers) have to work together to use data, graphs and illustrations to solve for varied transportation challenges. These challenges (scenarios), five in all, require roadway improvements to reduce the number of crashes. Students are tasked with reading and

interpreting the data in such a way as to help them determine where to spend their limited monies (budget) in order to reduce the most crashes in a three year period. This challenge requires that students work together much like real-world engineers who have to address problems, solve them to meet a public need, and all while working within a budgeted dollar figure – in this case \$625,000.00.

The Applied Technology (High Tech Machines) class just finished working on the Computer Numeric Code (CNC) Router. There were not many projects conducted with this commercial grade machine, but students were able to manually code a project where they have to set up a work piece on the router table and lock the work piece in place using sacrifice boards made of wood. Then, students were tasked with using the router software to move the gantry around until they had properly established the router home position. At this point students went into the edit software and set a router feed rate and then programmed the movement coordinates (x, y, z) of the router until the desired design was accomplished. The program could then be simulated with the software and eventually routed with the machine. Students will now changeover to the vinyl cutter and begin working on glass etching, thermal t-shirt designs, and vinyl signing for walls/vehicles.




Workshop Location:




Now is the time to get started on your art project or collecting photos!
