He was driving the speed limit of 35 miles per hour through a quiet residential neighborhood. His destination, the high school, was less than two miles away. He collided with a parked car and died of his injuries.

This true story involved one quick choice and less than four seconds.

According to research conducted at Cohen Children's Medical Center in New York, more than 3,000 teens are killed annually from texting-related automobile crashes.

Related to texting while driving, every parent must ask themselves:

- Am I using my phone while driving?
- Do I control my phone, or does my phone control me?
- Have I admitted to my teens that I can't ensure that they survive?

The first two questions are simple and straightforward. As we all know, actions speak louder than words. Children get their first driving lessons as soon as they reach the size allowing forward-facing car safety seats. Kids rarely develop better self-control than what they see possessed by their parents.


The final question is less obvious yet extremely important. Do our teens know that their lives depend on the quality of their own decisions? Or have we led them to believe that we can somehow rescue them from every poor choice they make?

Teen: "What do you mean? I guess no."

Parent: "You're right. As much as I wish that I could always keep you from making a tragic mistake, who needs to be the one who does this?"

Wow! Our school library has a new interface! We have an online library collection database that is available to you at all times. Within the school webpage, click on Academics to locate the Library page. When you are reading the Library page, look for the blue words Library Collection. Click on those words. You will be connecting to a database called LibraryWorld. Key in the username: Ashley public school. Click enter. There is no password.

You are able to search our library collection using the traditional ways of entering the title, subject, or author. There are other searching technique options too. You will receive a screen with the book you are searching for, and you can check to see if the book is available for checkout or not. To be able to hold a book for you, you do need to ask Mrs. Bender for your barcode number.

Besides using this online version, you have a free app for your device. To access the app, click on the link that is on the Library webpage located under the Library Collection link. You are able to check if our library has the book available from any of your locations. Even when you are at a bookstore or reading a book order, take a moment to check to see if your library owns a copy of the book. Place the book on hold or find Mrs. Bender the next school day for check out. This is frugal book shopping. If we do not have your book of interest, remember there is interlibrary loan available – just ask Mrs. Bender for help in locating your book.


