- 8. Have a picnic at a state park.





Wyndmere went on to claim the championship for the second year in a row for class B small schools. Ashley took fourth.


### May 7, 2018 7:00 PM AHS

Another fun thing they've been doing is working with Alliteration. Alliteration is where you use the same beginning letter for a phrase, or a funny sentence.


In Science, the students created their own planets which they really enjoyed. We've had a Fraction Frenzy in our class, learning about many things you can do with them!

# Using the guidelines and other factors mentioned...

# Consider the following Questions and Tips

- How does your child feel about the situation?
  Look at the child's age in relationship to growth, behavior and judgement.
- What are the responsibilities your child will be left with?
- Will the child be able to handle those responsibilities?
- How long will the child be left alone?
   The first few times should be quite short. You will be able to stay away longer once the child is confident about safety.
- What are the safety risks if your child is alone? (fires, accidents, burglaries, etc.)
- Can your child say no to peer pressure if friends encourage the child to break rules in your absence?

### Safety tips

## to Consider

Encourage the child to discuss feelings about being alone. If a child seems afraid, help her to talk about it and help her feel safe. Establish ground rules. This avoids confusion about what you expect and adds to the child's own sense of security. Careful planning can help insure physical safety and emotional well being for your child.

Remove fire hazards and install smoke detectors. Hold fire drills with each child "practicing" what to do and where to go in case of fire.

Teach children basic first aid and have a first aid kit available.

Have children practice emergency (911) calls with you, giving their full address and directions if necessary.

Review safety rules such as not playing with matches, knives and scissors.

Teach children when and if to answer the door and phone. Warn children to never let strangers into the house.

Instruct children to never tell callers that they are alone. They should say that the parent is busy and offer to take a message. If a call seems suspicious, they should call you or another adult.

Have a clear understanding about use of ovens, stoves, and other appliances.

Provide projects and materials as well as juice and nutritious snacks.

Set up an emergency plan with a relative, friend or neighbor who may be unable to care for your child but who would be willing to be called by the child for advice or reassurance in "small energencies" when you are unavailable by phone.

When you leave, post your house address and important phone numbers near the telephone.

Establish a daily routine in which your child calls you or a designated person when she arrives home.

If your child comes home after school, give her keys and perhaps an attractive key chain. The keys should be carried our of sight so that the child isn't easily identified as one on his own.

Arrange some after school activities such as clubs, scouts, sports or the library. If you need help with transportation, arrange to trade weekend driving or child care with other parents.

When you return home, praise your child for doing a good job. You may be pleasantly surprised at how readily and how well your child assumes responsibility when fully prepared and given the opportunity.

### Written Notification of Interactive Dashboard (School District Report Card)

Dear Parent/Guardian,

North Dakota has launched a new website designed to help communities across the state access important information about K-12 districts and schools. NDInsights features easy-to-read reports on multiple measures of school success, including:

- Test scores
- Graduation rates
- English Learner progress
- Student attendance.

NDInsights, or more commonly referred to as the "Dashboard," is part of North Dakota's new accountability system. It is the next step in a series of major shifts in public education that have raised the bar for student learning, transformed testing, and placed the focus on equity for all students. To learn more about the state's accountability and continuous improvement, visit North Dakota's ESSA website.

To find out more information about our school, visit NDInsights, select "Find My School," and search alphabetically for our school.

### Why a new system and new tool?

North Dakota is committed to informing communities about how well our schools are doing. North Dakota's future success depends on tapping into the potential of all students, so they graduate choice ready with the knowledge, skills and disposition to be successful. For schools to reach this goal, teachers, parents, and the community need clear and useful measures of progress. As an accountability tool, the Dashboard will help the state identify schools receiving additional support and assistance.

### What is different?

In the past, the accountability system for districts and schools relied heavily on test scores. But one test taken on one particular day does not provide a complete picture of all the ways schools are helping students succeed. The Dashboard continues to provide information on different aspects of student performance, but also includes information on school growth and other factors reflecting a more comprehensive view. The Dashboard replaces the former School District Report Card and Adequate Yearly Progress (AYP) reports.

Please note, the data made available to the public masks or hides data for groups with 10 or fewer students to protect confidential information about individual students.

### What's next for our district?

We have strong plans for working to improve the educational programs at our school. We would like you and your child(ren) to continue to be active participants in our educational system. Please help support our high expectations for student achievement by participating in the school educational initiatives, offering input and support in our endeavors to raise student achievement, or volunteering at the school. Meeting our school's goals will take a united effort, and I look forward to working with our families to ensure success for each student.


