

-FLEXIBLE SEATING-

Changes to a learning environment are often driven by a teacher's philosophy regarding how students learn, observing the way they learn, and analyzing how can we best support them in that learning.

The learning space is an important aspect of the whole educational experience. One cannot have a community of learners without having a positive instructional climate. Instructors help to create this climate by everything that they do, from the way they respond to student questions to the arrangement of the classroom chairs. For some students, traditional seating hinders their ability to use the classroom in the ways they need to accomplish the learning goals set for them as modern learners.

The classroom environment should mirror what students will encounter in their future careers, and collaboration, problem solving, and meaning making are at the forefront of most job descriptions. Standard desks situated in rows do not always foster open communication and collaboration, which has led to what is called *flexible seating*. Part of the solution to help kids learn more in line with their own learning styles and attention span needs, is introducing flexible seating in classrooms. Flexible seating can include a variety of seating arrangements, types of chairs, and a standing station for those who prefer not to sit. Research shows the benefit of flexible seating are:




- Effective learning
- Better cognitive performance
- Higher ability to concentrate
- Improved memory retention
- Higher academic achievement
- Improved behavior
- Students are less disruptive
- Students are better able to focus on the tasks they were assigned
- Fewer disciplinary incidents are reported
- Excess energy is used up




Library News

Dear Parents and APS staff,

McIntosh Public Health will be offering flu shots at APS on Wednesday, October 10th, 2018, to all school aged children and school staff. The Advisory Committee on Immunization Practices (ACIP) recommends annual influenza vaccination for all people ages 6 months and up. Attached is the Vaccine Information Statement for the flu shot (inactivated influenza vaccine.

In order for you or your child to receive a flu immunization, please complete the flu vaccination consent form including insurance or ND Medicaid information. The completed form must be returned to the school office by October 9th.

If you have any questions about the flu shot, need assistance with completing the consent form, or wish to schedule an office appointment, do not hesitate to call our office at 288-3957.








WHY DO STUDENTS LEAD THE CONFERENCES?

e believe that student involvement in the conferences makes learning active, provides opportunities for students to evaluate their own performance, and encourages students to take responsibility for their learning. Having students take charge of the conference makes them more accountable for what they are learning.

In addition, this form of conferencing creates a partnership between the home and the school that is hard to get in any other way. Both research and experience have demonstrated that student-led conferences offer many benefits including the following:

Stronger sense of accountability among students - **Stronger** sense of

pride in achievement among students - **More** productive student-teacher relationships - **Development** of leadership skills among students - **Greater** parental participation in conferences, & **Increased** teacher focus on standard.

What Does a Student-Led Conference Look Like?

Prior to the conference, students will collect work that reflects what they have learned. Students will select work samples to show their strengths and weaknesses. This work will usually be assembled in a portfolio or folder. As the students conduct the conference, they will explain skills they have learned and share goals they have set for themselves.



We believe that student-led conferences are an important experience for all students and hope that all parents will be able to participate. Your role is critical to the success of the conference.

Listener...

Your first role is as a listener. Having a parent audience for learning gives students a powerful reason to learn and work hard.

What's the Role of the Student During Student-Led Conferences?

Students should be able to explain academic standards, discuss how the standards are reflected in their classroom work, and be able to set goals for improving performance during the next academic term.

What's the Role of the Teacher in Student-Led Conferences?

Teachers have several roles in preparing and conducting student-led conferences. Critical to the success of the conferences are three major activities:

• The teacher makes sure that all students know and can discuss the academic standards.

- The teacher makes sure conference materials are available for students and parents.
- The teacher organizes the conferences to ensure successful communication.

What Should a Parent Do If He or She Cannot Attend the Conference?

Student-led conferences can be a very valuable time for you and your child. Please do your best to be available for these conferences. If it is not possible for you to attend alternate appointment times, you may want to ask a grandparent, another relative, or perhaps a family friend to take your place.

Talk...

Your second role as a parent is to talk with the student about the work that will be presented. You will gain a better understanding of the academic expectations set for your child.

Support...

Your third role as a parent is to identify ways you can support the student to achieve goals that will be set for the next grading period.

NORTH DAKOTA DEPARTMENT OF PUBLIC INSTRUCTION

House Bill (HB) 1389 took effect August 1, 2017. This bill creates a new section to chapter 15.1-21 of the North Dakota Century Code (NDCC.) NDCC 15.1-21-08.1. states, "A student's parent may direct the school district in which the student is enrolled not to administer to the student any state test or state assessment required in accordance with section 15.1-21-08."

This code further details, which assessments are, and are not exempt, as well as the process for completing a parental directive. The North Dakota Department of Public Instruction is to provide a form to districts to use in obtaining a parent directive to withhold administration of a student assessment. Attached is the standard form that will be used throughout the state by all school districts. This form must be posted to your district's website prior to the start of the 2017-2018 school year. Parents will need to complete an individual form for each student and each assessment from which they wish to be exempt, as well as the school year in which they are requesting exemption. The form is to be completed each year by the parent in order for the student to be exempt in the current school year. School districts are required to retain the form in the student's file and to compile information for a yearly report, regarding how many directives were received, demographic characteristic breakdowns of students whose parents have requested exemptions, and any loss of funding as a result of parent directives.
